Guideline for Authors

- The contributor is expected to follow The Chicago Manual of Style of Method for their submission.
- Contributions must be submitted in MS-Word (.docx), Font must be Times New Roman, Font Size 12 pt., Line Spacing 1.5, Article should be written in English and composed on A4 size paper.
- Each article should accompany an abstract not extending 200 words and 5-6 Keywords.
- The word limit for each article should range within 3000-3500 words. The word limit is inclusive of list citations, endnotes and bibliography.
- For review article, the word limit for each article should range within 1500-2000 words.
- Endnotes to be given throughout the paper, commencing from '1' and followed accordingly. The numbers are to be super scripted with the corresponding/ consequent text.
- The reference should follow the following format:
